By doing so he was led from the pain of suffering and rebirth towards the path of Enlightenment and became known as the Buddha or "awakened one".</p> <p>-Know of the three jewels, three signs of being, four noble truths, noble eight-fold path</p> <p>-A key concept of Buddhism is Nirvana, the most enlightened, and blissful state that one can achieve.</p> <p>-Buddhism is different from many other faiths because it is not centred on the relationship between humanity and God. Buddhists do not believe in a personal creator God.</p> <p>-Buddhist believe that there is a cycle of birth, life and death and rebirth. This goes on and on. They believe that unless someone gains Enlightenment, when they die they will be reborn. If a person can gain Enlightenment, they can break out of this cycle.</p> <p>-Breaking out of the cycle is called Nirvana (sometimes called Nibbana). It is the end of everything that is not perfect. It is perfect peace, free of suffering.</p> <p>-Meditation-Buddhists try to reach Nirvana by following the Buddha's teaching and by meditating.</p> <p>-Examine some rules for monks (227 rules) from the book Tripitaka (three baskets of Wisdom).</p> <p>-Buddhist symbols and their meanings-wheel of life and lotus flower</p>		<p>What makes Leicester Diverse?</p> <p>Find out about local examples of different religious communities in area, looking at changes over time, and differences between them: food, buildings, community work.
