## **Attendance**

## Reception - Rosen

#### Settling In

This term in reception has been all about settling into a routine at school, using manners and following the rules. It is lovely to see that, even those who found it difficult to say good bye to mum and dad in the mornings, our children come to school happy each day.

#### Matching, Sorting and Categorising

The children in Rosen have spent a lot of time learning about matching, sorting and categorising. We have been exploring sorting items by its mass (heavy and light), ordering by size (small, medium big/large), and categorising buttons.



#### **Exploring Senses and Describing**

We have explored the senses and began describing objects by their texture (how they feel) and learning words to describe how our food tastes. We used our vocabulary of taste and touch to then adapt a Goldilocks story, where Daddy bears porridge was too sour and Mummy bears porridge was too spicy. Children have also learnt to retell the story of The Little Red Hen and Goldilocks and the Three Bears.

#### **Investigating Floating and Sinking**

We have started to investigate floating, sinking and waterproof materials and will use our knowledge and creative skills to design, build and test boats





## <u>Year 1/2 – Bryon, Donaldson & Murphy</u>

#### Science

In science this term children in year 1/2 have been learning about everyday materials. They have been discovering the different properties various materials have and have been working scientifically by sorting various materials into groups.

The children particularly enjoyed investigating which material would be best to use for an umbrella. Children have been confidently using key vocabulary such as waterproof, opaque, transparent, insulate and absorbent while part taking in this unit of learning.





#### Computing

In Year 1/2, children have been learning that technology is defined by items that help them. Children have been using paint to create images and add relevant text. The paint tools they have learnt include brush, spray can and eraser. The children have learnt about the components of computer such as the keyboard, screen and trackpad. The children have been challenging themselves on how to use a mouse. The children have also considered the ways in which we need to be responsible when using technology.







## Year 1/2 - Bryon, Donaldson & Murphy

#### **Phonics**

Year 1/2 children have been working incredibly hard this term to learn new Phase 5 diagraphs in their phonics sessions. They have been learning that digraphs can make many different sounds. The children are building their confidence in both reading and writing sentences containing the new diagraphs.

The children are increasing their knowledge of new tricky words, as well as matching newly learnt vocabulary to pictures. In guided reading, the children are continuing to learnt three main skills. These are decoding: to sound out words. Prosody: to add expression to their reading by changing their voice, and comprehension: to answer questions about what they have read and provide their opinion.





#### <u>Art</u>

Year 1/2 have been creating some colourful, bright rangoli patterns for culture day. We have used lots different materials to help us create our wonderful designs. We have been trying to work on accuracy within all of our tasks including this one!

When completing any art task, we have been practising colouring while trying to stay within the lines. It has proved a challenge but we will keep trying!







## <u>Year 3/4 – Dahl, Rowling & Morpurgo</u>

#### Maths

In maths lessons, children have learnt how to round numbers to the nearest 10, 100 and 1000. They have used metre rulers to create their own number lines to support them to do this.





#### Science

During science lessons. Year 3/4 have been learning about the states of matter. The children have worked in teams using their problem-solving skills to develop an investigation to consider how different factors affect the rate of evaporation.



#### <u>Geography</u>

Year 3/4 have been learning about the water cycle and the processes of evaporation, condensation and precipitation. In groups, the children created their own water cycle using different types of material. Children have also learnt about the journey of a river which involved learning new vocabulary such as meander, tributaries and source.






## <u>Year 3/4 – Dahl, Rowling & Morpurgo</u>

#### Art

Year 3/4 have learnt to sketch lightly using different pressures of the pencil in order to show tone and texture in an observation drawing. We have also discussed the life of Vincent Van Gogh who is one of the most famous artists in history. The children created artwork in the style of Van Gogh. They used his colours and images and developed their drawing skills. They experimented with a variety of mixed media such as oil pastels, watercolours, poster paint, wax crayons and pencil crayons.









#### Music

In music lessons, year 3/4 have been listening to the band ABBA and learning how to sing Mamma Mia. They have composed their own music using the glockenspiels and adding this into the song Mamma Mia.





## <u>Year 5 – Rauf & Zephaniah</u>

#### Music

Children in Year 5 have been learning about beats and rhythms. They have been working hard on learning notes on the glockenspiel. They have learnt the song 'Livin on a Prayer', as well as the accompanying notes. The children have also been playing along to jazz music!





#### Computing

In computing, Year 5 children have been studying computer systems and networks. The children have learnt about how web searches work, which information is shown and why this is. They have learnt about sponsored adverts that are online and how these influence search engine results. The children have learnt about different forms of technology such as smart lockers and pedestrian crossings.

#### French

Year 5 children have been learning about French nouns and adjectives. The children have used this knowledge to create their own descriptive sentences about monsters and aliens!



## Year 6 - Almond & Blackman

#### PE

Year 6 have been learning how to pass the ball with accuracy (pocket pass and pop pass) in Rugby to successfully score a try. They have also been learning to close in the gap to slow the attacking team down.

#### Science

In Science, Year 6 have been investigating the conditions (temperature) in which bread grows mould the best. They put the bread in a range of places such as fridge, freezer, cupboard, window, and under the table. They will be observing over time and checking every two to three days.

#### <u>Drama</u>

This half-term, Year 6 have been busy practising and performing for their faith assembly – Diwali. They have worked hard, creating props, displays, learning their lines and perfecting their voice projection and acting skills.







#### Computing

The Year 6 children have been learning about computer systems, networks, communication and collaboration. They have learnt about the wide range of ways in which information can be sent, and worked to determine which is the most effective way of doing this. The children have explored Google Classrooms as a way of communicating and working with others using the internet.

#### **French**

The children in Year 6 have been learning about how to ask and answer questions in French about sports. This included learning about a range of sports and how to give their opinion about them. The children worked to design their own Olympic games. Year 6 have also been learning about where in the world French is spoken as a main language.





#### Music


Year 6 children have loved learning the song 'Happy' by Pharrell Williams. They have learnt how to play the song on the glockenspiel, as well as the lyrics to sing along! They have worked to form their own opinions on a range of songs in the themes of 'happiness'.

#### Reception and Year 1/2 Mr Maile recommends: Sharing a Shell by Julia Donaldson


Sharing a Shell is a fantastic story about the unlikely friendship between three sea creatures – a hermit crab, a bristle worm and an anemone. The three of them become good friends when they realise they can use each of their unique abilities to help each other.

This book teaches us to how to share and how to appreciate what makes each of us different. Mr Maile would also recommend the book to anyone who enjoys learning about sea life (Mr Maile learnt that anemones can sting with their tentacles!) and to anyone who likes colourful illustrations.

# Year 3/4 Mrs Shukla recommends: The Lost happy Endings by Carol Ann Duffy

The Lost Happy Endings" by Carol Ann Duffy tells the story of Jub, a magical, six-fingered girl whose job is to collect the Happy Endings from stories each night. One evening, a wicked Witch steals the bag of Happy Endings.

Jub must go on an adventure through the forest, encountering fairy-tale characters and woodland creatures, to save the stories and ensure they have their rightful happy endings. The story explores themes of power, courage, and the importance of storytelling itself.


#### Year 3/4

This book is about words and phrases - old, new, and long forgotten that celebrate harmony, unity, and the universal languages that connect people across the world.



The characters in this book are starting a new school and there are lots of highs and lows on the way. We can all learn a great deal from this book about how to treat others.




## Recommended Reads - Children




The Prehistoric Usborne World - I like this book because it is about dinosaurs and how they used to live




My favourite book is Lost on Gibbon Island by Jess Butterworth because I enjoy reading diary style books. This book is also an adventurous story.
