The PP attendance is below overall by 1.2 but had improved since the end of autumn term – again a number of actions were taken to support rise in attendance, including sporting activities as an incentive. No significant difference between boys and girls attendance. AO mixed B. and White E. lowest attendance.

Year 1: Overall attendance 93.8, this is also the lowest attendance overall in year groups 1 to 6. Overall figure is -2.2% below target of 96%. No difference between boys v girls attendance 93.8. PP attendance (88.8) is a cause for concern, this figure is the lowest of all year groups, in-relation to PP. This is also the lowest attendance figure of all sub groups in this cohort (year 1). 3 out of 4 PP pupils below 90%. ### KS2 tackling Persistent Absence through morning physical activities

#### Rational:

As part of ongoing, whole school M&E activities, Pupil attendance analysis was carried out across KS2.

Attendance percentages were collected from all Key Stage Two classes. The analysis was carried out by the Phase Leader and disseminated to the Senior Leadership Team. This was completed to enable identification of children's attendance percentage and highlight any attendance concerns, which were set at 92% or below.

#### Focus:

As part of ongoing initiative to raise the attendance percentage across the whole of KS2, this initiative would focus predominantly on engaging children in morning physical activity in order to improve their attendance. Following analysis of the percentages over the first month of the academic year, children were identified and a programme was created. (please see appendix 1). The children then took part in the programme and further analysis was carried out at the end of the Autumn Term (1:2).

#### Main Findings:

There were 47 Key Stage Two children that took part in the programme. Of the 47 children that took part in KS2, 33 of them had an improved attendance %, with 14 of them managing an attendance of 95% or above for 1:2; and 14 of the children that took part regressed in their attendance compared to their attendance in 1:1.

Average attendance of the 47 children improved from 84% (1:1) to 89% (1:2) Average increase of the 47 children was 5%

#### Strengths and areas of development:

33 children improved their attendance (1:2) compared to 1:1

- 14 of the 33 children had a 1:2 attendance % of 95% or above.
- 13 of the 47 children that took part, have an overall Autumn Term attendance % of over 92%.
- Average attendance of the 47 children improved from 84% (1:1) to 89% (1:2)
- Average increase of the 47 children was 5%

Areas of development based on the programme and percentages:

- Focus on children that are still not achieving 92% for the term
- Focus on potential class issue in 3MN
- Focus on developing the programme to continue and further raise % attendances.

Overall, the children's attendance % has improved as a result of a multi-faceted approach, of which the physical activity is one.

- Target those with termly % less than 92%
- Improve programme of study for these children
- Refer children with continuing concern to the DSL

#### Recommendations:

#### Look at potential rewards

- Inform parents of attendance concerns

#### Actions as a result:

- Feedback to SLT and DSL the findings of the attendance analysis for KS2;

## Actions taken to support attendance

At Herrick Primary School, we check all attendance and reasons for absence daily. We contact parents when the school has not been notified of absences. Attendance is monitored as part of our duty of care for pupils to access full time education in like with UK legislation.

If a child is absent from school for 3 days in a given week, we ask for medical evidence to support the child's absence. Medical evidence can include copies of prescriptions, doctors notes and discharge forms from the hospital. If no evidence is provided to the school then the Designated Safeguarding Lead (DSL, Arzu Aydin) is notified. The DSL will then will contact parents. In the case that the school cannot get into contact with parents, a letter is sent to parents. The EWO (Education Welfare Officer) may be contacted depending on the child's history of absence, persistent absence, absence across the family group, the number of consecutive absences or pattern of absences, or if the school suspects the child may have left the country. Please see the attached sheet.

As part of our wrap around care offer, breakfast club runs from 8.00am until the start of the school day to ensure children are present at school on time, especially for parents are working or find it difficult to drop off their children on time.

Children with persistent absences and lateness are invited to join a morning Sports Club. The club encourages children to improve their attendance and significant improvements have been shown for the academic year 22-23 (Table 1).

Daily registration checks are made and the percentage attendance for the class is calculated. THE OFFICE AND Headteacher meet weekly to discuss any attendance concerns. A file is kept in the office with the whole school attendance and data from the start of the academic year. Information kept in the attendance folder includes: how many children are absent a day, the percent attendance for each class, and the whole school attendance in numbers and percentages for each week and term.

Children with persistent absences are monitored. Their parents are invited to meet with Mrs Aydin (DSL) to discuss the reasons for their absences. Classes with 100% attendance receive an award at the end of the week which consists of a certificate and a trophy as acknowledgment.

In the Spring and Summer term, structured interviews were conducted with children with poor attendance. In the interviews, children were asked if there is a particular day that they do not like to attend school and other questions to find the reasons behind their persistent absence from the child's point of view.

The education welfare officer (EWO) attends meeting at the school once a month with the DSL to discuss children's attendance for children below 95%. A letter will be sent from school or the EWO dependant on the percent of attendance. If the attendance is low and no improvement is made, then the EWO will send a letter to parents for a panel meeting which the parents must attend. If no further improvement is made, parents could be required to attend a court hearing, which could result in a fine, or if they have been fined previously, a prison sentence. Herrick Primary School tracks the late collections and arrivals of children. Repeated late arrival and collection can result in a letter which is sent to parents. Please see the attached documents.

On the enclosed percentage attendance chart, there was a decrease in attendance to 83.98% (84%) for the week ending 5<sup>th</sup> November 2021. This was due to the Diwali holiday, which spanned two days.

## KS1 – Attendance Questionnaire Analysis (children identified as Persistent Absence – conducted in autumn)

Do you like coming to school? Around 40% of pupils responded 'Sometimes'. One pupil responded 'Never'. All other pupils responded 'Always'. Do you like to learn? Around 40% of pupils responded 'Sometimes', and over 60% of pupils responded 'Always'.

Do you like your class and teacher? Al pupils responded 'Always' to the question.

What do you enjoy best at school? All pupils responded to the question. The majority of pupils said they enjoy playtime and fun activities within lesson time. Three pupils answered explicitly that they like learning/activities surrounding learning in school.

Is there anything that you don't like about school? Five pupils gave reasons they do not like school. Answers included missing their parents, finding learning boring, being told off in school, and not liking mess. One child indicated a food they do not like. All other pupils who answered responded 'No' to the question.

What subjects do you like? A range of answers were given, including: Reading/Literacy, Maths, History, Art, PE, English, Science, Phonics One pupil said that they do not know which lessons they like.

What subjects do you not like? Four pupils said they do not like Maths, 2 said they do not like Reading, and 2 said they do not like P.E. All other pupils did not answer, or stated that there was not a specific lesson that they do not like.

Is there an area of the school you feel unsafe in? Two pupils responded that they do not like the halls, one of which explaining because the hall is too big. One pupil stated that they do not like the field. All other pupils responded 'No' to the question.

Is there any day at school that you don't like? Three pupils indicated specific days that they do not like to attend school, one of which gave a reason why. All other pupils responded 'No' to the question.

What do you like to do at home? The majority of pupils answered that they like playing whilst at home, with siblings or other family members. Three pupils indicated they like to watch TV and two pupils indicated that they like to do extra work/learning at home.

#### Other comments

Two pupils commented on liking the open areas within school. One pupil requested more writing lessons.

Do you feel scared in school? All pupils responded 'No' to this question.

# KS2 – Attendance Questionnaire Analysis (children identified as Persistent Absence – conducted in Autumn)

Do you like coming to school? Pupils' answers were equally split between 'Always' and 'Sometimes'.

Do you attend afterschool clubs? All pupils answered that they never attend afterschool clubs.

Do you do activities outside of school? One pupil answered that they 'Sometimes' attend activities out of school, but the rest of the pupils answered that they 'never' attend activities outside of school.

Do you like your class and teacher? One pupil answered that they 'Sometimes' like their class ad teacher, all other pupils answered 'Always' to the question.

Do you like to learn? Over two thirds of the pupils answered 'Yes'. Other pupils answered 'Sometimes' or explained specifically what they like to learn.

What is your favourite subject? A range of answers were given, including: Reading/Literacy, Maths, History, Art, PE, English, Science Is there any day that you do not like to come to school? Two pupils specified days they did not like to attend school. All other pupils answered 'No'.

Do you have any brothers or sisters? All pupils who answered had one or more siblings.


Do you feel unsafe when you are in school? One pupil answered that they sometimes feel unsafe. All other pupils answered 'No'.
